

School Mission Statement Lowell Elementary School challenges its students, staff and families to be inspired, confident learners; we celebrate diversity and contribute as citizens of the global community.


School Goals Anchored in AMO and district-provided student achievement data, the following will serve as the school academic goals: For intermediate grades (3-5), we will increase the percentage of students who meet or exceed typical growth on the state math test from 89% to 95%. In 4th grade, we will increase the percentage of students proficient on the state writing test from 85% to 95%. For 5th grade, we will increase the percentage of students proficient on the state science test from 85% to 90%.

LITERACY: Implement a data-driven comprehensive balanced literacy instructional program. Use of Readers and Writers curriculum supplemented as needed with Every Child a Writer, Words Their Way, and/or Read 180 resources to address ELA standards. Support students in the development of effective reading skills and strategies through the use of guided reading groups. Students read "just right" books and explore different genres, authors and texts. Students engage in critical thinking, shared inquiry, and reflection as they read, respond and discuss selected texts in literature circles. Teachers work in Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) to improve assessment of student reading and the use of information to make adjustments in instruction. Teachers work with classroom, district, and state assessments and conferring notes to provide targeted literacy instruction. Through the use of the analytic traits, writing is integrated into content areas.

MATH: Vertical alignment of math instruction using a balanced mathematics instructional program approach. The use of Everyday Math curriculum supplemented as needed with Singapore Math or ReThink Math! resources to address math standards. School-wide implementation of REACH Core Habits of Teaching and Learning through professional development lead by math specialist. Teachers collaboratively plan EDM lessons and formative assessments to use with each EDM unit.
